For additional support with the declaration requirements for your journey, please see the <u>Trader Journey Assistant</u>. This tool will ask you a series of questions to point you towards the required declarations and the relevant guidance for your goods movement.

1 Introduction

Customs requirements have been introduced under the Windsor Framework (WF) for goods that move between Great Britain (GB) and Northern Ireland (NI).

All traders are required to complete declarations to move goods into NI; customs duty and other charges may need to be paid on those deemed 'at risk' of being moved into Ireland and the European Union (EU). This means that traders are now required to submit information about their goods and movements in advance, and check if they require additional authorisations and documents (see <u>GOV.UK</u>).

The Trader Support Service (TSS) was established to support traders with these new requirements. It is a simple and free-to-use online service to help traders meet their customs requirements and move goods into, and out of, NI.

To do this, you will need to have registered for an account on the <u>TSS Portal</u>. Knowing how to register will help your business continue to trade seamlessly, and this will be the focus of this guide.

There are two profile account types supported on TSS:

- 'Trader' profiles for businesses importing or moving goods into NI
- 'Agent' profiles for professional customs agents who hold a commercial agreement to act in the name of, and on behalf of, another business/trader (referred to as their direct representative); you can find more information about this on GOV.UK

This guide will explain the registration processes for both profile types, which are very similar.

There are a few additional requirements to register for a customs agent profile, and these differences are highlighted throughout this guide in grey shaded boxes such as this one.

¹Terms used in this guide refer to the terminology used on the TSS Portal. Please note that these may not match the most recent terms used on GOV.UK, in HMRC's Customs Declaration Service or the Northern Ireland Online Tariff on GOV.UK.





Regardless of whether you are a trader or customs agent, you will need to complete all sections of this guide to successfully register for a TSS account.

2 How do I register?

Navigate to the TSS Portal.

 Click on the Register button, which you will find in the top right-hand corner of your screen. You will be redirected to a new page displaying a Registration Options section, as shown in the screenshot below:

- Here you will see the following three options, and you should select the one that applies to you:
 - Additional User Registration select this option if your company has already completed the business registration process on TSS and you would like to add yourself as an additional colleague to your company's TSS profile
 - Please note, your company will have received a notification email containing a unique reference number for your business. You will need this number to register.
 - Register Your Company as a trader or carrier select this option if you are a business importing or moving goods into NI




 Register as a Customs Agent – select this option if you are a professional customs agent who holds a commercial agreement to act in the name of, and on behalf of, another business/trader

TSS also offers free training and guidance via the <u>Northern Ireland Customs & Trade Academy (NICTA)</u> website.

3 Add your contact details

Once the registration form is open, add your details into the **Trader Details** section, completing the mandatory fields marked with a red asterisk as a minimum: **First Name**, **Last Name**, business **Email** address, **Contact Number**.




If you have the information available for the non-mandatory fields such as **Job Title**, it is advised that you add this too.

4 Add your company information

Navigate down the page to the **Company Details** section and input the requested data; the mandatory data fields are denoted with red asterisks. If you require help completing the form, please see the <u>Field Information Guide</u> on the TSS Portal, which will open in a new browser window.

Some of the information requested in the **Company Details** section of the form is required to generate declarations. This can be amended later within your **Company Profile** page.





- Add the Company Name for your business, using the same details that you use in correspondence with HMRC
- The EORI Number (or XI EORI Number) is a unique customs ID for businesses who undertake goods movements

If you are registering for a customs agent account, adding your Economic Operators Registration and Identification (EORI) number – a GB prefixed EORI – and Northern Ireland (XI) EORI Numbers at this stage is mandatory.

If you are a trader and do not yet have a GB EORI or XI EORI number, you may leave this field blank. However, a valid EORI number must be entered subsequently before you are able to submit declarations through TSS, as the service will use this to identify your business in declarations made to HMRC. It will also be required when selecting certain methods of payment to pay customs debt.

Following the UK's departure from the EU, you need an EORI to move goods between GB (England, Scotland and Wales) and the EU. You may also need one if you move goods to or from NI.

If you have not yet applied for an EORI number, you can apply on GOV.UK. It only takes five to ten minutes to apply (provided you have the required information to hand), and your EORI number should arrive within five working days, depending on HMRC checks.

- 3. Add the address details for your business including the Street, City and Post Code fields
- 4. Select the **Country Code** for your business from the drop-down menu (e.g., 'United Kingdom (GB)')



5. Add your Company Email address and Company Phone number






If you have chosen to register as a customs agent, this **Type** field will already be set to 'Customs Agent' and will be read-only.

In your company profile:

7. Select 'Yes' in the field **Do you hold a Customs Freight Simplified Procedures (CFSP)** - **SDE authorisation for Northern Ireland?** if your business has been authorised by HMRC to use CFSP authorisation to make a simplified declaration when your goods arrive at a UK port or airport, and enter your **CFSP SDE Authorisation Number** in the next field



If you selected 'Yes' TSS will submit any simplified declarations using your CFSP SDE authorisation. If you do not have a CFSP SDE authorisation number, select 'No' and TSS will process your declarations using its own CFSP authorisation.

More information on CFSP authorisations can be found on GOV.UK.


Note: You may see CFSP authorisation referred to in GOV.UK materials as the authorisation to use simplified declaration procedures (see <u>GOV.UK</u> for more details). As the term CFSP authorisation is used through the TSS system, this guide uses CFSP authorisation to make navigating the TSS Portal as easy as possible.

8. If your business holds a CFSP EIR authorisation from HMRC to make a simplified declaration by entering the goods into your own records (known as Entry Into Declarant's Records or EIDR) when they arrive at a UK port or airport, select 'Yes' in the drop-down field Do you hold a Customs Freight Simplified Procedures (CFSP) - EIR authorisation for Northern Ireland?

Enter your CFSP EIR Authorisation Number in the next field. This field will not appear if 'No' was selected for the first question.

Note: You will be able to associate further authorisations with your account, including your UK Internal Market Scheme (UKIMS) authorisation, after you have successfully registered.






- 9. The field will only accept the CFSP EIR Authorisation Number when entered in the following format:
 - A 2-digit code identifying the member state of authorisation, i.e. 'XI'
 - A 3-digit code indicating that an EIDR authorisation is held, i.e. 'EIR'
 - An authorisation number, which is either:
 - A 12-digit number suffixed with an 'I'




OR

- A 27-digit number



10. If your business has a Duty Deferment Account (DDA) suitable for use on goods movement into NI, supported by a Customs Comprehensive Guarantee (CCG), and which has been linked to HMRC's Customs Declaration Service (CDS) system, select 'Yes' in the field Do you have a valid Duty Deferment Account (DDA) associated with XI EORI?

A DDA enables an authorised trader to defer customs duties, excise duties, any import VAT or other charges associated with the movement of goods, by requiring a payment by direct debit for all consignments within an accounting period, instead of requiring payments for individual consignments up front. Deferment is only available in certain circumstances and for certain types of declarations, as explained in the Payments: Step-by-Step guide using TSS on NICTA. Deferred duty, import VAT and excise charges will be charged against your DDA.






As a customs agent you will be able to use your DDA to pay customs debt for your own business. In addition, you will be able to pay customs debt on behalf of traders you represent for Full Frontier Declarations (FFD) only.

If your business does not have a DDA that can be used for movements into NI, answer 'No' to this question. The TSS Duty Deferment Account will then be used instead and you will need to pay duty and VAT to TSS, as explained in the Payments: Step-by-Step guide using TSS on NICTA.

Refer to GOV.UK for information if you want to apply for your own DDA.

- 11. If you select 'Yes' to the question Do you have a valid Duty Deferment Account (DDA) associated with XI EORI? you will need to complete these additional fields:
 - Deferment Account Number for XI EORI: the format is 'NNNNNNN' (7 digits)
 - Guarantee Reference Number for XI EORI: the format is 'GBCGUNNNNNNNNNNNNNNYYYYMMDDHHMMSS' or 'XICGUNNNNNNNNNNNNNNYYYYMMDDHHMMSS'
 - DPO Number (Deferment of payment authorisation) for XI EORI: the format is 'GBDPONNNNNNN' or 'XIDPONNNNNNN' (the last 7 digits comprise the DAN, above)
 - I have provided authorisation to TSS on my CDS account to use my DDA details on my behalf ('Yes'/'No'): if you do wish to use your own DDA for payment of customs debt, you must select 'Yes' after you have provided standing authority to TSS to use your DDA as your representative through your CDS dashboard (see GOV.UK) using the TSS EORI number. Failing to complete this latter step will mean this authorisation is incomplete and the declarations will return with errors from CDS. If you require further assistance please refer to the guidance on GOV.UK





12. Do you need to use a Parent Organisation Authorisation on your declarations?

Parent Organisation Authorisations are only required in the exceptional circumstances where you wish to use a Duty Deferment Account or Special Procedure authorisation that is associated with a Parent Company EORI, rather than the Importer EORI. The following new **mandatory** drop-down field has been introduced on the Trader Registration page



If you select 'Yes' the Parent Organisation EORI Field will be displayed, and you should enter the EORI number of the parent organisation.



Note: If you wish to use a Duty Deferment Account associated with a parent company, the parent company details should be completed in the **Deferment Account Number for XI EORI** field and the **DPO Number (Deferment of payment authorisation) for XI EORI** field.

13. Select 'Yes' to the question Do you want the company name to be private? If you want to keep your company's name private, but please note that it may increase the risk of declaration errors when validating trader EORI numbers



When you fill in a declaration, if you enter a GB EORI number in the **Importer EORI** field at consignment level, the name and address of the importer also needs to be entered.




If you select '**No**' to the question **Do you want the company name to be private?** the TSS system will auto-populate the Importers name and address details for you in the declaration.

Note: If you select '**No**' for this question and later on you enter a GB EORI in the **Importer EORI** field (at the consignment level) on a declaration you intend to complete, the name and address of the importer will also need to be entered at that point.

If you select 'Yes' to the question Do you want the company name to be private? the TSS system will not be able to auto-populate the Importer's name and address details for you and you will be required to enter these manually.

14. Company Size is not a mandatory field. However, you may wish to indicate whether you are a small, medium or large company using the drop-down menu. Justification for Chosen Size is not a mandatory field but can be completed if you wish



15. You must have provided your VAT Registration Number if you select 'Postponed VAT Accounting (PVA)' in your declarations to postpone your import VAT and choose to pay through your periodic VAT return by using 'Postponed VAT Accounting (PVA)'.

Otherwise, the VAT Registration Number field is not mandatory



16. Commodity Codes classify goods for import and export so that traders can fill in declarations and other paperwork, check if there is duty or VAT to pay on goods and find out about duty reliefs. Before you start using TSS for your customs declarations, you will need to know the Commodity Codes that apply to the goods you intend to move



To successfully prepare, you should begin to consider what commodity codes will apply and declare them in your profile. TSS will then use these to help you understand the declaration process you are required to follow.

More information on how to find out your commodity codes can be found on <u>GOV.UK</u> and in the guide <u>An overview of tariff classification</u> on NICTA.



17. If your company commonly used specific Customs Procedure Codes (CPC) (which are now referred to as Procedure Codes in CDS) please insert a comma-separated list of those codes in this field:



Before you start using TSS for your customs declarations, you will need to know the **Procedure Codes** that apply to the goods you intend to move. More information can be found on <u>GOV.UK</u>.

18. Respond with 'Yes' or 'No' to Do you move goods into NI that are subject to commercial processing?



If you select 'Yes', you will be asked Are you eligible for any of these exemptions related to commercial processing?




As part of the Windsor Framework, you can declare goods 'not at risk' as long as you hold a UKIMS authorisation. If you are a UKIMS authorised trader and you meet the exemptions below, you will be able to declare your goods 'not at risk'.

- Turnover exemption: your turnover is less than £2 million
- Approved processing sector: if your business operates within the approved list of sectors



19. Select 'Yes' or 'No' to the question Have you received subsidy from any other sources?







20. Enter your company's Experience of importing and exporting




21. Enter How many shipments do you make monthly using the options in the drop-down



22. Respond with either 'Yes' or 'No' to the fields relating to your business trading relationships between countries and regions, as appropriate



23. If your company moves goods under duty suspension, select 'Yes' to the question **Do** goods move under duty suspension (for example under Transit or Warehousing)




Duty suspension is defined as a temporary exclusion from paying excise duties allowed by a taxing authority, under certain conditions, when goods arrive from a foreign



24. Respond to How often you use the services of a fast parcel operator weekly using the selection provided




25. When 'Trader' is selected as the **Type** of business, then an additional field is presented: **Traders - do you use a broker or intermediary**. Select the appropriate answer from the drop-down



26. Confirm the Number of product lines for your business



27. Select one of the options for What industry or sector do you operate in



- 28. For Will your business be required to make full declarations through TSS, select 'Yes' if you are a trader intending to:
 - Make Rest of World (excluding EU) to NI movements



- Make air or maritime (sea) inventory-linked movements
- Make air non inventory-linked movements in a Full Frontier Declaration
- Use customs procedures that are not supported on the simplified declarations process



A Full Frontier Declaration means all customs declaration information must be provided in advance of goods arriving at a UK port or airport, moving into a different customs territory.

This is in contrast with the TSS simplified journey. The TSS simplified journey allows businesses to move goods from GB into NI by making a simplified declaration before the goods move and then providing the full information about the goods after they have moved. This is the most common journey on TSS.

The TSS simplified journey requires:

- A safety and security declaration, known as the Entry Summary Declaration, which must be done prior to the goods entering NI (usually completed by the carrier)
 AND
- The customs declarations, which is divided into multiple steps:
 - A Simplified Frontier Declaration, usually auto-generated by TSS from the information provided in the Entry Summary Declaration, made before the goods movement using a simplified data set
 - A Supplementary Declaration, requiring a full data set which is always completed after the goods move and is used to close the customs journey and pay any required duties and other charges; this step is covered in this guide

Submission of the Supplementary Declaration in TSS is required by the tenth calendar day of the month following the goods movement.

Submission of the Supplementary Declaration is the responsibility of the importer of record, as indicated by the Importer EORI on the TSS Simplified Frontier Declaration.

A Final Supplementary Declaration, detailing the number of Supplementary
Declarations finalised for a reporting period (i.e., arrivals with tax point date in the
previous calendar month) compared to the Supplementary Declarations due, which
TSS will automatically submit on your behalf

29. Fill in your CSE Authorisation Number. The CSE authorisation number must be a total of 32 characters, start with 'GBCSE' followed by 12 characters, an 'E' at the 18th character and the date and time in the last 14 characters 'YYYYMMDDHHmmss'; where YYYY is the 4-digit year, MM is the 2-digit month, DD is the 2-digit day, HH is the 2-digit hour (24hr clock), mm is the 2-digit minute and ss is the 2-digit second. For example, 'GBCSE123456789000E20191023163657'



30. Once all details have been added to the form, you will need to agree to the TSS Privacy
Policy and Terms and Conditions, and validate that you are not a robot before clicking the Submit button




5 Actions following registration

Once the initial registration steps have been completed, you will receive two notifications containing your unique TSS registration number, which can then be used by other colleagues to request access to the TSS registration for your company. The other notification will contain details to complete the registration and log in.

Note: All other colleagues added after the initial company registration is complete will require verification. Below is an example email notification.





Once you have logged in using information from the notifications you receive, you will be able to add and update the information for your company registration and complete missing data, prior to progressing declarations for your business. You will also be able to verify colleagues who have requested a trader registration, as well as add additional addresses for your business. You can manage your email preferences and choose which contacts receive account level emails after account set-up. Further details can be found in the How to use the TSS Portal guide on NICTA.

Validation of XI EORI Numbers

After you have registered, if you have added an XI EORI number there will be a field in your Company Profile called XI EORI Valid? This will be populated with either 'Yes' or 'No', which indicates whether HMRC has successfully validated your XI EORI number.





You should check this field to ensure the XI EORI number you have entered has been validated. If the XI EORI Valid? field is populated with 'No' your XI EORI will need to be validated by HMRC. Please refer to the 'Create a New Consignment' section in the ENS Stepby-step guide: Standard Process and Consignment First Process for more information on this process.
