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February Windsor Framework Webinar: stay informed and prepared

- Questions and Answer session



New Windsor Framework TSS Portal feature: are you 'IMMI Ready'?

Following the update on 2 February 2025, you can now view your own company dashboard on your TSS Company profile, which shows if your TSS profile is 'IMMI Ready'.

TSS have summarised all the Windsor Framework processes you can add and set up on your TSS Company profile to help you make use of the simplified processes for Internal Market Movements.



To see the dashboard above, which will be visible for all users on the TSS account, the Primary account holder will need to answer 'Yes' to the question **Are you planning on using the Windsor Framework features?** at the top of your TSS Company Profile.

- This question refers to using the Windsor Framework simplified processes to submit Internal Market Movement Information (IMMI) for your 'not at risk' goods movement from GB to NI.
- If you select 'Yes' the dashboard will then be visible and TSS will review your profile and identify actions you can take to ensure you are 'IMMI Ready'. As each action is completed, the dashboard will update to reflect the changes you make to your profile.
- If you are not planning on using the Windsor Framework simplified processes you can select 'No' so that TSS know your choice and movement preference.

TSS tip: are your TSS Company Profile settings correct?

Avoid incorrect information on your declaration: check your TSS Company Profile settings

We urge all businesses with a TSS account to check that the information entered on their TSS company profile is correct. This includes all traders, hauliers, and carriers.

Why is this important?

The information from your TSS company profile can be used to populate data on your movements, so if the information is not correct on your profile this may lead to incorrect information declared on your movement.

We would like to highlight one section in particular: 'Do you want the company name to be private?' If you select 'Yes' this means that your name and address is kept private and cannot


be auto populated into required fields on the movements by TSS. Your EORI, company name and address are needed in movements on the TSS Portal, so selecting **'Yes'** to this question means that for each movement your company name and address needs to be manually entered, as TSS cannot help to populate the fields. It can be time-consuming for the submitter to repeatedly enter this information and can often lead to significant errors on the declaration, as incorrect information is submitted.

How can I make this easier?

- Check your privacy settings and ensure they are set to 'No' to optimise efficiency.
- Where asked Do you want the company name to be private? selecting 'No' will allow TSS
 to automatically populate this information from your TSS company profile using your
 EORI number.

Will this mean that everyone has access to my information?

No, the submitter needs to know your EORI number for the movement already. On entering that EORI onto the movement, the associated company name and address is populated from that company profile, and it is not possible to access your information any other way. Your company name and address need to be entered on the movement regardless.



While you are reviewing your TSS Company profile, please check all sections are correct, and in particular:

- Company name using the same details that you use in correspondence with HMRC
- EORI Number XI EORI number where you have an XI EORI, this should be used
- Company address this is your business registered address

Note that any fields marked with a * are mandatory and must be completed on the company profile.

Future changes: how to complete your GMR when you use the TSS simplified journey for standard goods

Get ready for 31 March 2025

There will be changes to the Goods Vehicle Movement Service (GVMS) on how to submit your information for standard goods movements using the <u>TSS Simplified Procedure</u>. You will be required to submit information, known as a Notification of Presentation (NOP), via GVMS for standard goods moved using Entry Into Declarant's Records (EIDR) to Northern Ireland.

If you plan to use a pre-movement IMMI or currently use a <u>Simplified Frontier Declaration</u> or a <u>Full Frontier Declaration</u>, then this does not affect your movements as you already submit the necessary information pre-movement.

Importantly, you must continue to add all Movement Reference Numbers (MRN) for each movement into GVMS to obtain your GMR, to ensure your declarations are arrived correctly and maintain compliant goods movements.

What are the changes?

When you receive an email with your MRN for applicable movements, TSS will provide you with the Local Reference Number (LRN) and the procedure code that you will need for GVMS. If you are moving standard non-controlled goods on the TSS simplified journey, the Procedure Code is '4000'.

What can TSS do to support?

Did you know that you can automate your GMR submission through the TSS Portal so you don't have to submit the information to GVMS manually? This is called 'GMR automation'. If you choose this option in your company profile, TSS will submit the information to GVMS on your behalf using the information you submitted to TSS for the Entry Summary Declaration.

TSS Application Programming Interface (API)

TSS has developed functionality to automate the upload of information required to create declarations. This automated process is available for all declaration types and the <u>TSS API</u>

<u>Reference How-to guide</u> now includes support for the simplified processes for Internal Market Movements.

The TSS uses industry standard API protocols enabling experienced IT departments to develop and build automated upload procedures. There are test environments available for developers to build and test their API processes before using them to submit real declarations. Organisations interested in using this API can register for access via their company profile on the TSS Portal.

What is an Application Programming Interface (API)?

An API is a standardised and automated way for computer programs to interact with each other (e.g., to transfer data or access functionality). In the case of TSS, the API allows traders to give their computer systems automated access to similar functionality that a human operator access via the TSS Portal.

How does the API work?

To interact with the API, the trader's software sends a request to the TSS system (much like how your web browser would request a website or upload a photo). This contains the same type of data a manual user would enter into the TSS Portal. TSS processes this request and replies to the trader's system with either confirmation or an error. There are two types of relevant errors.

How to get started

- <u>API: Functional Guide</u>: this is an introductory guide to help the user navigate the API landscape within TSS.

Once you are registered for the TSS API you can request help at any stage of this process via the TSS Portal (see the <u>How to use the TSS Portal</u> guide for details on how to raise a case in TSS).

Are you using the correct goods descriptions in the TSS Portal?

The **Goods Description** field is mandatory in TSS movements and must be completed in plain language and provide a detailed description of what is being shipped.



This ensures that checks for taxes and duties can be performed smoothly and that the goods will be stored, handled and transported safely. Inadequate or generic descriptions such as 'accessories' or 'samples' may result in delays before or after movement. Shipments can be returned or seized if there are ambiguities.

Consider the following when entering a goods description: what are your goods, what are they made of, and what is their purpose?

- If your goods are packaged, this should be included in the Goods Description field.
- For branded items include the brand and model number; for example, 'Garmin Forerunner 55 smartwatch, black casing, silicon strap'.
- For excise goods, include the volume, brand name and container size; for example, 'Hand rolling tobacco, Amber Leaf, 500g'.
- For alcohol goods include the strength; for example, 'Gin, Gordon's London Dry, 700ml, ABV 40%'.
- Where goods are grouped under a single commodity code, the word 'grouping' should be added; for example, 'Machine knitted woollen vests grouping'.

Use of Meursing codes when moving 'not at risk' goods under UKIMS

If you are a UK Internal Market Scheme (UKIMS) authorised trader using your authorisation to move 'not at risk' goods from Great Britain (GB) to Northern Ireland (NI), you can use the code 7000 for all commodities requiring a Meursing Code.

What are Meursing Codes?

Meursing codes are additional codes that describes the composition of goods containing certain types of milk and sugars and applies specific duties to these goods depending on the code.

The appropriate code should still be used for declaring 'at risk' movements from GB to NI as well as all Rest of World movements to NI and can be identified using the <u>Look up Meursing</u> code tool on GOV.UK.
